By the end of camp the same child is shirtless and embracing the camp culture. The smiles, the friendships and the compassion for one another is heartwarming. The kids are open to one another and are supportive to all," she says.

Letitia Blackburn from Waiuku has a daughter who has been on camp twice.

"This year's camp was very active. The kids got to go to rocket ropes, meet the Breakers and go to a basketball game. It was a real confidence boost for her," Letitia says.

"She met people who attended the camps last year. It's good to have those friendships," she says.

She said it was particularly encouraging for her daughter to meet people who have been through the same experiences.
